The meeting will be held on Sunday July 16th , 2007, time yet to be determined pending the judging schedule (right before lunch or lunch time) at the show site.

## More Than Just Wrinkles!

When you here the words dog agility, many think of the ever popular Border Collie or Australian Shepherd. Both of which really excel at the sport. The first breed that comes to mind is rarely the Chinese Shar-Pei. Even though the Shar-Pei is not that popular at the trials, there are several people like myself that are completely hooked.



My purpose of this column is not to convince you that one organization is better than another, as each one has their pros and cons, but rather to help you get the information you may need to get a start on the sport if you chose to give it a try.



First of all, not every Shar-Pei can or will do well at agility. In fact, you as the owner must know your dog physically and mentally. You need a Pei that is structurally and mentally sound. By this I mean that you

should make sure that your dog's hips and elbows are x-rayed clear and that you are aware of the type of temperament that your dog possesses.



After you chose the dog you wish to start with the next step is to get the training. There are a lot of very knowledgeable people who excel in this sport and have great tips for teaching. The best advice for the beginner is to get involved in your local All-breed club. Most clubs offer one or all of the different sports such as: Conformation, Obedience, Agility, Flyball, and Rally O. If they don't offer all of these, don't worry, many of the members are involved in several sports and can be a great network for help and information. I live in a very remote area of Alberta and the dog clubs in the area offer all of the sports and more. Where there is a will there is a way.



There are 3 main organizations here in Canada that offers trials for titles and competition. There is NADAC – North American Dog Agility Council, AAC –

Agility Association of Canada, and CKC Agility. Depending where you live, one organization maybe more popular but they all offer great trials and experiences.



All three organizations require that your dog must be 18 months or older to enter a trial, individually registered, and only the CKC requires that your dog be purebred. Even though the three organizations have some similarities, they use different equipment and have different rules. It is in your best interest to make sure you train your dog properly on all the different obstacles if you plan on attending trials at all three organizations.



Now you are ready to start on an incredibly rewarding, frustrating, challenging and most times extremely addicting journey of dog training. I chose to obedience train the dogs that I was using for agility first. It is

not necessary but it does help. You will want to enroll in at least 2 sets of agility classes, practice at a few fun days, and learn the rules and regulations for the trials of your choice. I always recommend that if you can find the time it is very beneficial to volunteer at the trails. They are always looking for workers and it is amazing what you can learn by watching other more experienced dogs.



There is more than just teaching your dog the different obstacles. You should also learn to understand your dog and learn some handling techniques. If you are not a morning person, like me, you are in for a new experience. Agility trials start with “measuring in” (your dog can be wicketed to ensure they are jumping at the correct height), check in with the show secretary or gate Stewart, the judges briefing and the first dog on the line ready to run all before 8 A.M.



The early days are for good reason... many trials are held outdoors and the heat of the day

make it very difficult for the dogs and handlers. \*\*\*Be very cautious running any Shar-Pei on a very hot day. \*\*\* Our breed does not handle heat well and even though the run is all of 2 minutes or less, it is still too much for this breed in the extreme heat.



Packing for the trials can mean a lot less luggage than conformation. Make sure you have a good pair of running shoes, comfortable clothes, and good treats for your dog after the run. Pack enough food for the weekend but do not over feed your Shar-Pei and keep them in good athletic shape. This sport can be a great form of exercise for your dog, for you and your whole family. The sport is great for all ages ranging from Juniors up to the veterans..handlers and dogs ☺

The most important tool that you can take to the trial is your sense of humour. In all your hours of training, don't ever forget that you are working with a Shar-Pei. They are extremely intelligent, eager and willing to work. However, they get bored easy; they are stubborn and most have a bit of a clownish attitude. Just when you think that they know it all.... They will go out there and run their own course. At the end of every run, think about the positive things and tell your dog how good he is for getting a

qualifying score or just trying his best. If given the chance, Shar-Pei can prove to be excellent performance dogs. With proper training, they can shine in any arena...obedience, agility, tracking , herding, and more.

# Wrinklegram health matters!

## Lick Granuloma

The so-called "Lick granuloma" is a raised, usually ulcerated area on a dog's wrist or ankle area caused by the dog's own incessant licking.

### ~ WHY DO DOGS LICK THEMSELVES RAW? ~

This type of foot-chewing may be compared to nail-biting in people. We chew our nails when we are bored or worried, out of habit, or even as an obsessive/compulsive behavior. Often, we find similar motivations in these foot-chewing dogs. Frequently, there has been a change at home such as: lengthy confinement, addition of a new pet or human house-guest to the family, death or loss of a companion pet, loss of owner or absence of a family member, moving to a new home, boredom.

For many dogs, treating the skin lesion is not enough; the dog must be palliated psychologically as well. Extra attention to the pet on a reliable basis may be all that is needed; however, some dogs actually require psychoactive drugs.

### ~TREATMENT FOR THE SKIN ~

There is a lot of disagreement as to the best treatment to attempt first in a case of lick granuloma. Here is a summary of what we have found effective for most cases: A long-acting corticosteroid injection helps reduce the itchy sensation associated with healing.

Special wraps covering the wound allow healing to take place (though, at first, often an Elizabethan collar is important to keep the pet from bothering the wrap.)

Some veterinarians prefer specially mixed topicals to reduce inflammation in these areas.

Many lick granulomas may require a minimum of three weeks on antibiotics to clear the skin infection.

### ~TREATMENT FOR THE MIND~

For dogs who resume chewing as soon as treatment is discontinued or who simply change to a new foot, more than just extra attention may be necessary. The following medications are commonly used for people in reducing stress or depression as well as for treating obsessive/compulsive disorders.

**\*\*AMITRIPTYLINE** - helpful in only 30% of dogs but considerably cheaper than the others. It takes 4 weeks on medication to determine if there will be an effect. If the medication is found helpful, the pet continues on it. Approx. cost for 1 month of treatment for a 75 lb dog = \$15.00

**\*\*PROZAC** - helpful for 50% of dogs that lick. The medication is given for 4 weeks. If no response is seen, the dose is doubled for another 4 weeks. Medication is discontinued if a good response is seen. Approx. cost for 1 month of treatment for a 75 lb dog = \$135.00

**\*\*NALTREXONE** - helpful in 50-60% of cases. The pet takes the medication for only one month. If licking stops, it usually is stopped for weeks to months. Should licking resume, another course of medication may be instituted. Approx. cost for 1 month of treatment for a 50 lb dog = \$210.00

**\*\*ACUPUNCTURE** - has recently gained favor as a possible treatment and may be worth looking into. Some consultation with a behavioral specialist may be in order for more resistant cases.

# Spring Clean-up in the Yard

If you happen to live in an area that isn't buried under snow for six months out of the year, then this unpleasant aspect of dog ownership likely won't trouble you much. Or better yet, you do live in snowy climes but have much more willpower and hold against procrastination better than I do.

Every year, I swear to myself that I will follow the boys around the yard with a scoop, be it sleet, or hail, or raging blizzard. But alas ... every year the temperatures drop to minus forty degrees celsius and my previous determination from last spring is frozen solid (much like that I swore to collect on time). And every year, I'm out in the melting snow, picking up dog piles as they are exposed. Inch by melting inch. Beginning in March, and because of our cooler temperatures, often lasting until the beginning of June.

From June until November, the dreaded "doo-ty" becomes the usual "daily dozen\*\*" to be picked up in the evening of each day.

## Why Even Bother

Why not just let it sit there and degrade? Aside from the fact that I have small-ish children sharing the yard, dog poop is a health hazard. Left alone it can gather maggots, parasites from other animals, pass parasites TO other animals, which in turn pass them back to the dogs, and possibly us humans as well. The smell alone is also a good incentive to pick it up, as well as irate neighbours (who complain of the smell). Picking it up is also the best solution if you have a dog who like to snack on "poop-sicles" (coprophagia).

Disposal of dog poop might not be as simple a procedure as you think either. Many (if not most) townships, and county by-laws class dog poop as hazardous waste, and will not allow it to be picked up by city garbage collectors. What can be done with it then?

## Municipal/City Landfill Sites

These often have a separate section for hazardous waste disposal, and may charge a small

fee for individual pick-up if you are lucky enough to live in an area for it. If not, driving it to the landfill site may be your only option.

## Clean-up Services

Enterprising souls in larger and more populated areas have started up clean-up services. Sometimes the service offered includes both clean-up and disposal for a fee. Others may offer clean-up only. Check your yellow pages and business services directories to see if your area has one.

## Septic System for Dogs

Rather, more accurately, the Doggie Doolie Waste Disposal System. I love this concept, but it may be against your local by-laws to install any kind of septic system in your yard. It's a fairly simple concept, you pick it up and drop the waste in a hole, where chemicals and enzymes break it down into the soil. When I get one of these, I may be able to put an end to my winter procrastination (I hope). Even if I still put things off until spring, the aggravation, smell and back-breaking labour of picking up and bagging piles will be worth the eighty dollars I've spent.

The Daily Dozen : so named for my habit of procrastination, which causes "daily" to be more accurately "every other day-ly".

# Wrinklegram fun stuff!



## Bug Repellent :

Homemade Bug Repellent Recipe (courtesy of the Texas Collie Rescue Group)

Take a LARGE lemon and slice it paper thin. Put the slices into a bowl with a tablespoon of crushed rosemary leaves (or a 6 inch sprig of fresh rosemary). Pour over the top of this a quart of hot, nearly boiling, water. Let this steep overnight, then strain and put into a large spritzer bottle (note: buy a new spray bottle for this, don't reuse something that held household cleaning chemicals) Shake well before applying, and keep it in the refrigerator when not in use. The d-limeone in this spray along with the rosemary oil will give your dog a beautiful shiny coat and keep fleas and other bugs away, including

## DOG TREATS

2 cups wholewheat flour  
1/2 cup corn meal  
2/3 cup water  
1/2 cup oil

Mix together, roll out thin, cut as big as you wish with a cutter or, I use a pizza wheel and just make squares about 1"

Bake at 350 for 20-25 minutes.  
cool on a rack and store in fridge or I freeze them.

FOR BEEF----- substitute beef broth for the water

FOR CHICKEN--substitute chicken stock for the water

PEANUT BUTTER---add about 2 heaping tablespoons to dough, also may require a bit more flour now.

MOLASSES-----add about 2 tablespoons to dough, now may require a bit of extra flour

ROLLED OATS----- I have used oats instead of the corn meal....

some dogs are allergic to corn!!!!!!!!!!



## **BREED STANDARD**

### **Origin and Purpose**

It is generally accepted that the Chinese Shar-Pei originated during the Han Dynasty (202 BC-220 AD) in the village of Dah-Let near the South China Sea. These dogs were all purpose working dogs to guard the family, farms and temples.

### **General Appearance**

An alert, dignified, active, compact dog of medium size and substance, square in profile, close-coupled, the well proportioned head slightly but not overly large for the body. The short, harsh coat, the loose skin covering the head and body, the small ears, the "hippopotamus" muzzle shape and the high set tail impart to the Shar-Pei a unique look peculiar to him alone. The loose skin and wrinkles covering the head, neck and body are superabundant in puppies but these features may be limited to the head, neck and withers in the adult.

### **Temperament**

Regal, alert, intelligent, dignified, lordly, scowling, sober and snobbish, essentially independent and somewhat standoffish with strangers, but extreme in his devotion to his family. The Shar-Pei stands firmly on the ground with a calm, confident stature.

### **Size, Proportion, Substance**

The height is 18 to 20 inches (45-50 cm) at the withers. The weight is 40 to 60 pounds (18-27 kg). The dog is usually larger and more square bodied than the bitch but both appear well proportioned. Proportion: The height of the Shar-Pei from the ground to the withers is approximately equal to the length from the point of breast-bone to the point of rump.

### **Coat and Colour**

Coat-The extremely harsh coat is one of the distinguishing features of the breed. The coat is absolutely straight and offstanding on the main trunk

of the body but generally lies somewhat flatter on the limbs. The coat appears healthy without being shiny or lustrous. Acceptable coat lengths may range from extremely short "horse coat" up to the "brush coat", not to exceed one inch in length at the withers. A soft coat, a wavy coat, a coat in excess of 1" (2.5cm) in length at the withers or a coat that has been trimmed is a major fault. One coat type is not to be preferred over the other. The Shar-Pei is shown in its natural state. Colour-Only solid colours and sable are acceptable and are to be judged on equal basis. A solid coloured dog may have shading, primarily darker down the back and on the ears. The shading must be variations of the same body colour (except in sables) and may include darker hairs throughout the coat. A pigmented dog may have a darker mask on the face.

### **Head**

Large, slightly but not overly, proudly carried and covered with profuse wrinkles on the forehead continuing into side wrinkles framing the face. Eyes Dark, small, almond-shaped and deep set, displaying a scowling expression. In the dilute coloured dogs the eye colour may be lighter. Ears Extremely small rather thick, equilateral triangles in shape, slightly rounded at the tips, edges of the ear may curl. Ears lie flat against the head, are set wide apart and forward on the skull, pointing toward the eyes. The ears have the ability to move. Skull - Flat and broad, the stop moderately defined. Muzzle - One of the distinct features of the breed. It is broad and full with no suggestion of snipiness. The length from nose to stop is approximately the same as from stop to occiput. Nose Large and wide and darkly pigmented, preferably black but any colour nose conforming to the general coat colour of the dog is acceptable. In dilute colours, the preferred nose is self-coloured. Darkly pigmented cream Shar-Pei may have some light pigment either in the centre of their noses or on their entire nose. The lips and top of muzzle are well padded and may cause a slight bulge at the base of the nose. Tongue, Roof of Mouth, Gums and Flews Solid bluish-black is preferred in all coat colours except in dilute colours, which have a solid lavender pigmentation. A spotted tongue is a major fault. A solid pink tongue is a disqualification (Tongue colors may lighten due to heat stress; care must be taken not to confuse dilute pigmentation with a pink tongue). Teeth - Strong, meeting in a scissors bite. Deviation from a scissors bite is a major fault.

### **Neck**

Neck - Medium length, full and set well into the shoulders. There are moderate to heavy folds of loose skin and abundant dewlap about the neck and throat.

### **Forequarters**

Shoulders - Muscular, well laid back and sloping. Forelegs - When viewed from the front, straight, moderately spaced, with elbows close to the body.

*Breed Standard...continued*

When viewed from the side, the forelegs are straight, the pasterns are strong and flexible. The bone is substantial but never heavy and is of moderate length. Removal of front dewclaws is optional. Feet - Moderate in size, compact and firmly set, not splayed.

### **Body**

**Topline** The topline dips slightly behind the withers, slightly rising over the short, broad loin. **Chest** - Broad and deep with the brisket extending to the elbow and rising slightly under the loin. A level, roached or swayed topline shall be faulted. **Back** - Short and close-coupled. **Croup** - Flat, with the base of the tail set extremely high, clearly exposing an uptilted anus.

### **Hindquarters**

Muscular, strong, and moderately angulated. The metatarsi (hocks) are short, perpendicular to the ground and parallel to each other when viewed from the rear. Hind dewclaws must be removed. Feet as in front. **Tail** - The high set tail is a characteristic feature of the Shar-Pei. A low tail shall be faulted. The tail is thick and round at the base, tapering to a fine point and curling over to either side of the back. The absence of a complete tail is a disqualification.

### **Gait**

The movement of the Shar-Pei is to be judged at a trot. The gait is free and balanced with the feet tending to converge on a centre line of gravity when the dog moves at a vigorous trot. The gait combines good forward reach and a strong drive in the hindquarters. Proper movement is essential.

### **Major Faults**

1. Deviation from a scissors bite.
2. Spotted tongue.
3. A soft coat, a wavy coat, a coat in excess of 1" (2.5 cm) in length at the withers or a coat that has been trimmed.

### **Disqualification**

1. Pricked ears.
2. Solid pink tongue.
3. Absence of a complete tail.
4. Not a solid colour, i.e. Albino; Brindle; Parti-coloured (patches); spotted (including spots, ticked or roaning); Tan-Pointed Pattern (including typical black and tan or saddled patterns or shading that has a defined pattern i.e. distinct butterfly pattern on the chest).
